We remain focused on that unfinished business and on working to ensure gaps between the two communities are closed.

So please, rest assured and allow me to thank you for the fact that you are meeting need where it is needed most. You are doing so with exceptional generosity. I am proud of the charities we are funding together across Ireland and in Irish communities around the globe. Your extraordinary response to our *Promising Ireland* Campaign is a testament to your generosity and pride. The fact that we reached our initial Campaign goal a year and a half early and that we have now increased it by 40% will ensure that, through you, we are making an impact when it counts most.

Thank you for all you do to help and support the Irish as they rebuild their economy and society, North and South.

The Worldwide Ireland Funds launched the *Promising Ireland* Campaign to raise \$100 million by the end of 2013 on behalf of Irish charities and causes worldwide. In 2012, 19 months ahead of schedule, that goal was exceeded thanks to donors' generosity.

The Campaign's title—*Promising Ireland*—reflects The Ireland Funds' pledge to these groups as well as a belief in Ireland's future. THE ARK TAKES CHILDREN ON A **CULTURAL JOURNEY WITH HELP** FROM THE IRELAND FUNDS









THE ENERGY OF TWENTY 7-YEAR-OLD CHILDREN EXPLORING A NEW ENVIRONMENT IS A JOYFUL THING TO WATCH.

Some go straight to the clay; others stare with wonder at jars of sea creatures and coral. Artist Terry O'Farrell gathers the group together in the sun-filled room and asks, "Tell me, what is important to you? What would you like to carve into this clay?"



The Ark is a place where children age 2-12 are empowered and encouraged to answer such questions through creative expression. Opened in 1995, it was Europe's first cultural center for children. The multi-story building in the heart of Dublin is laid out with children in mind: colors, textures, and A "TOUCH EVERYTHING" ATTITUDE MAKE CHILDREN

FEEL ENGAGED AND WELCOMED. The Ark's deliberately broad definition of "culture" is inclusive: literature, dance, music, new technologies, and film are just some of the mediums used to inspire children, their families, schools, and communities. Programs are developed in-house with an eye to hands-on interaction. These programs are complemented by a cadre of visiting artists who hold workshops with children.







One of the first things parents and teachers note when children come to The Ark is the quality of engagement. It is not uncommon to see children who struggle in the classroom develop newfound confidence and concentration through creative activities at The Ark. Parents report that children who don't speak about what they are doing at school have come home and not been able to stop talking about their visits.

"EVERY SINGLE CHILD, REGARDLESS OF BACK-GROUND, INCOME, OR ABILITY, HAS A RIGHT TO A RICH CULTURAL LIFE," SAID EINA MCHUGH, DIRECTOR OF THE ARK. "WE ARE PASSIONATE ABOUT WHAT ART CAN DO IN A CHILD'S LIFE."

Eina explained that while fun is an ever-present theme for children as they come through the doors, there are larger benefits that come with it. "Outside evaluators have shown us that children who are involved in our programs miss fewer days at school. They have a higher level of well-being. Their communications skills improve. A key quote from one of the reports was, 'The Ark has proven that high-quality arts can make a transformative difference in communities."

The Ireland Funds were early supporters of The Ark back before the doors even opened. In 1991, the Irish Government decided to establish Temple Bar as a "cultural quarter" and a space geared toward children was explored. The Ireland Funds identified The Ark as a project with great potential and provided early funding. Today, over 1,000 artists, including award-winning authors, poets, and musicians have partnered with The Ark to bring quality arts experiences to children. The name "The Ark" was chosen not only because it was a word that children found easy to say, but also because it represented a voyage to someplace new and wonderful.

MUSIC AND THEATER-A RENEWED FOCUS


Maria Fleming, Theater Programmer at the Ark expressed gratitude for The Ireland Funds' involvement over the years. "It makes such a difference to have people alongside us like The Ireland Funds. Projects like The Ark are for dreamers and visionaries, for people who see beyond today and actually believe in and commit to the future. That commitment is so rare and we are grateful."

In June 2011, The Ark launched a three-year focus on music programs for schools and families. The most recent grant from The Ireland Funds has supported this initiative by funding a music program called "Play", which was a series of hands-on workshops and concerts for children that were held with world-class musicians. The theater program at The Ark continues to drive forward the next generation of new theater work for children and is additionally exploring performances that are geared to children with autism.

"This is a difficult time for Ireland," said Maria. "We have a unique culture here in Ireland and it really is our strength. When we get funding from the diaspora it is such a vote of confidence. The Ireland Funds are known to many people and the funding is a stamp of approval that we deeply appreciate."


Gallery spaces, a theater, a rooftop garden, and interactive digital exhibits are all part of The Ark experience. In addition to the content-rich programs for children, the organization advocates for arts education through symposiums, workshops, and initiatives that have shown benefits across Ireland.

The evaluations show the organization's impact and after 17 years, the methodology used is proven. But a seven year old doesn't much care about these things. All that really matters to her is the joy of her hands in clay, a jar of terrific sea creatures, and an opportunity to have fun while learning. The Ireland Funds are proud to support The Ark, where the children can begin a creative and cultural journey that hopefully lasts a lifetime.



LAST YEAR, COPE GALWAY

prepared and delivered over 50,000 nutritious and customized meals to older people living in Galway. Their Community Catering program is an award-winning approach that breaks the mold of the stereotypes many people associate with "meals on wheels." Instead of a cookie-cutter menu with no choice, meals are prepared based on recipients' dietary requirements and preferences. Over 200 meals a day, each marked with an individual's name, are delivered to homes by a network of more than 140 volunteers. On 16 routes that range from the urban center to rural routes in the Galway countryside, a highly personalized system ensures that if someone is unable to eat sodium, or simply doesn't enjoy apples, those items will never be included in their delivery.



What are always delivered, however, are kind words, a listening ear, and an eye for any issues that may require a helping hand. The volunteers who bring the meals are often the lifeline for older people who maintain a proudly guarded independence, but may need assistance on occasion.


Geraldine Ryan, Executive Chef at COPE Galway Community Catering, said, "Our service is not new; however, our approach to it is new in a sector which now needs to embrace change. While we have advanced significantly with the production aspect of our service, we are proud to have maintained equal emphasis on the value of the daily social contact. This is rated by older people as being of equal importance to the food they receive. The flexibility and the personalization of our service are unique. Our ability to respond in a way to our service users cannot be achieved via commercial ready-to-eat meals."

THE LUNCH CLUBS

A Place, A Song, A Meal Together

Another facet of COPE Galway's outreach to older people is their Lunch Club program. For those who are able to come out and socialize with others, COPE Galway sponsors weekly Lunch Clubs at locations around Galway where older people drop in, enjoy a beautifully prepared and nutritious meal, and also enjoy the social aspect of an





afternoon with others. The opportunity often allows them to learn about the other services available to them through COPE Galway such as their Day Centres, where activities like cooking, art, exercise, and computer training are offered.

At one Lunch Club held in the local GAA hall, over 20 people gathered on a Monday afternoon. On the menu were hearty Irish stew and beautifully prepared salmon. Volunteers welcomed diners to set tables and conversations from the week before were resumed. The affectionate joking made it clear that many had known one another for decades, but those new to the Lunch Club were also welcomed.

Anne Kenny, Manager of Senior Support Services with COPE Galway, and Jacquie Horan, CEO of COPE Galway, sat down to discuss COPE Galway's impact today and what the future would hold. Anne explained, "It is hard for people of any age to participate in organized activities. But we say to people, 'You can come just for lunch...that's OK, or you can engage with additional services.' There is a relationship building element to what we do. Many of the folks that come to our Lunch Club may not have realized the services that are available to them. We build that trust and then can see that they benefit."


Jacquie elaborated on why their programs will continue to be important in the future. "Ireland's population is aging. The statistics tell us that over the next two to three decades, a quarter of our population will be over 70 years old and a significant number will be over 80 years old. This tells us that our planning needs to gear to this. One of our goals is to get the older population to think about their nutritional needs. Part of opening that conversation is the establishment of our Lunch Clubs. The positive association they have carries over to the time when they may need our meal delivery service."

"The grant that came from The Ireland Funds last year made a significant difference to the services we provide here in the city," said Anne. "Thanks to that funding, we have a community worker who was able to go out into three new communities to begin additional Lunch Clubs."

We asked Jacquie what it was like running the organization at a time of great need in Ireland. Had it become harder to do the work that was needed in the community? Jacquie answered, "There is a strong coming together of community now. I think that this was missing during the Celtic Tiger. People want to offer their time and their services in a way that helps communities. An increased number of older people are experiencing loneliness. I think this is why the Lunch Clubs are coming into their moment. And here, they can come together once or twice a week to have a nutritious meal in great company. We are constantly seeking new sources of funding to bring lunch clubs to more and more areas of the county as older people are often very isolated in rural areas."

m IT}$ is considered one of the beloved pieces of iconic Irish art. Every Irish schoolchild knows of its importance. The Marriage of Strongbow and Aoife depicts the marriage of the daughter of Leinster King, Dermot MacMorrough, to Strongbow, the Norman conqueror of Ireland. It is a massive piece, full of symbolism, and is considered one of Maclise's best works. And today, this national Irish treasure is in need of care and conservation.

In partnership with The Ireland Funds and their focus on preserving the best of Irish culture and heritage, this care and conservation is now underway. The project is one of ten international projects enabled by the Bank of America Merrill Lynch Art Conservation Programme. The Bank of America Merrill Lynch Art Conservation Project was piloted in Europe, the Middle East, and Africa in 2010 and provided funding to restore a diverse range of works of art in 10 countries. The project has been expanded to Asia Pacific, Latin America, and the United States in 2011-2012 to facilitate the restoration of 20 art and artifacts that display important cultural and historical value around the world.

Below, the National Gallery of Ireland tells of the importance of this work and how support from The Ireland Funds and Bank of America Merrill Lynch Art Conservation Programme will benefit generations to come.

THE NATIONAL GALLERY OF IRELAND

is the country's premier cultural attraction devoted to the care, research, and display of its national collection of fine and modern art. Founded in 1854 by an Act of Parliament, and opened to the public in 1864, the Gallery houses over 14,500 works of art spanning the period circa 1300s to 1950s. As a national institution, the Gallery has an important collection of historic Irish paintings dating from the seventeenth century with works by Thomas Roberts, James Barry, Nathaniel Hone, Daniel Maclise, Roderic O'Conor, John Lavery, William Orpen, Mary Swanzy, Paul Henry, and Jack B. Yeats. The Gallery is also renowned for the range and quality of its European collection, which comprises important works by Fra Angelico, Caravaggio, Rembrandt, Poussin, Goya, Picasso, Bonnard, and Van Gogh. Funded by the State, the Gallery provides free access to the public seven days a week.

Since its inception, the Gallery has been the fortunate recipient of bequests and gifts. In 1950, the Gallery was listed as a beneficiary of the estate of Irish writer and playwright George Bernard Shaw (1856-1950), who had a long relationship with the institution. The income from Shaw's royalties has greatly

benefited the Gallery over the years, contributing to the acquisition of over 100 works of art, in addition to a generous contribution towards the construction of the Millennium Wing (2002). Other prominent benefactors of the Gallery include Alfred Chester Beatty (1875–1978), the Irish American mining mogul who gifted 93 paintings representative of the realist and orientalist traditions in nineteenth-century French art. Without doubt, the presentation in 1987 of seventeen masterpieces from the prestigious collection of Sir Alfred and Lady Beit constituted one of the most celebrated gifts of the twentieth cen-

tury comprising rare works by Vermeer, Velázquez, Goya, Hals, and Metsu. Paintings by Picasso and Gris entered the collection in 1986 through the generosity of Máire MacNeill Sweeney, whose brother-in-law, James Johnson Sweeney, was former director of the Guggenheim Museum in New York. In 1993, Caravaggio's long lost masterpiece *The Taking of Christ* was unveiled to the public and placed on indefinite loan to the National Gallery, where it takes pride of place in the collection.

The last two decades have seen enormous development in the form of gifts to the collection and contributions towards building projects. The Gallery's library and archive collections, which house and research material from the Yeats Archive, Centre for the Study of Irish Art, and Fine Art Library have been enriched with items of historic value and enable members of the public, students, and historians to better understand the development of the visual arts in Ireland. In 2010, Sir Denis Mahon (1900–2011), one of the foremost collectors and scholars of the twentieth century, presented his entire personal library and archive to the Gallery. This gift is considered the most important scholarly resource to the Gallery in recent years.

Many benefactors to the National Gallery of Ireland have been introduced through The Worldwide Ireland Funds. The Millennium Wing is the most recent addition to the Gallery's complex of buildings, which was designed by Benson & Forsyth and opened to the public in 2002. This award-winning architectural facility in Dublin city was funded by the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF), the Shaw Fund, and numerous Ireland Fund supporters such as Lew Glucksman and Loretta Brennan Glucksman, Sir Anthony and Lady O'Reilly, Brian and Eileen Burns, Fred and Kay Krehbiel.

More recently, a donor-advised gift by the Bank of America Foundation has enabled the conservation of one of the most important historic Irish pictures in the Gallery's collection, The Marriage of Strongbow and Aoife (1854) by Cork-born artist Daniel Maclise (1806-1870). The project on this enormous canvas (317 x 515 cm) commenced in October 2010 with the aim of preserving this significant work for future generations. Given its history, execution, and exceptional scale, the project, which is being carried out by the Gallery's Conservation Department, led by Simone Mancini, presents many exciting challenges. To ensure

that the conservation process on the painting can be communicated to a wider public, the Gallery has devoted a special section to the project on its website ('Saving a National Treasure'), with video footage on progress to date together with commentaries from sponsors and conservation scientists. The National Gallery of Ireland, like many of its sister institutions, is responding to the changes in today's society and environment that present new challenges for the museum sector. A growing awareness of cultural tourism encourages heritage sites like the National Gallery of Ireland to develop its programmes and services in line with twenty-first century

practices, both onsite and online. Today, the institution has enabled greater access to its collection and ancillary programmes through developments in its web technology. Visitors can access over 2,500 works from the Gallery's collection through its website (www.nationalgallery.ie), as well as follow progress on exciting conservation projects such as Maclise's The Marriage of Strongbow and Aoife. In 2011, the National Gallery of Ireland embarked on an extensive refurbishment programme of its historic complex of buildings on Merrion Square, namely the Dargan and Milltown wings which date to 1864 and 1903 respectively. The project involves the repair and replacement of the roofs to provide advanced daylight control for the exhibition spaces below. The entire fabric and services of the building will also be upgraded to modern standards, which will greatly improve the Gallery's ability to protect, preserve, and display the collection. It will provide for new accommodation for the collection and a range of key operations, including conservation, education, library, archives, and photography. While the refurbishment and development programme will be the main focus of activity for the Gallery up until 2015, visitors will continue to have access to the best of the collection on display. There will also be opportunities to bring its collection to a wider audience nationally and internationally.



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
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THE AWB VINCENT AMERICAN IRELAND FUND LITERARY AWARD

A LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD FOR NOBEL LAUREATE SEAMUS HEANEY





Funds Conference in Cork was the awarding of The Lifetime

Achievement Award to Seamus Heaney. Mr. Heaney was the second recipient of the AWB Vincent American Ireland Fund Literary Award back in 1973 and has remained a dear friend to The Ireland Funds ever since. In June, before an audience of 250 donors and guests that included Taoiseach Enda Kenny and former US President Bill Clinton, Mr. Heaney thanked The Ireland Funds for their endorsement in the early days of his career and for the difference they had made to the work of Irish writers over the past 40 years. Below is a reflection on Seamus Heaney by Dr. Maurice Hayes.

When in 1973 the Trustees of the American-Irish Foundation made a modest award to the young Seamus Heaney, they displayed prescience, a critical acuity and a nose for a winner that was to be vindicated by the ultimate accolade of the Nobel Prize for Literature.

The first award had gone to the venerable Austin Clarke in recognition of a lifetime of service to poetry. For the second, the Trustees put their money on a young emerging talent - and what a talent that turned out to be. As a safe bet, it must have been the greatest racing certainty since Pegasus bounded down Parnassus bearing Poetry.

That award enabled the young poet to complete his important second collection, North, as he acknowledged in a prefatory note. Since then it has been The Ireland Funds (as successors in title to the Foundation) who have been indebted to him-not only for the poetry, but for his friendship (which is equally legendary) and his willingness to oblige. Along with Marie, his constant Muse, he has been a familiar presence at events, a source of inspiration and encouragement, even in the darkest days, lighting the candle of hope. His tutelage and kindly monitoring over the years have helped maintain the standard, and the standing, of the Literary Award.

Of another beloved Irish writer of an earlier age who also managed to be a Citizen of the World while remaining firmly earthed in the soil of his native place, the great Dr. Johnson wrote that 'There is nothing which he touched which he has not adorned'.

THE HISTORY OF THE AWB VINCENT AMERICAN IRELAND FUND LITERARY AWARD

1 9 7 2 - 2 0 1 2

In 1972, Tom Jordan conceived for the American-Irish Foundation the notion of a bursary which would allow a promising young writer to devote a full year to her or his work. When the American-Irish Foundation and The Ireland Fund were merged, the Award, by then well established and well regarded, was continued.

The objectives of the Award are to give young writers a boost and creative space and also recognize those whose lifetime contributions have enriched Ireland's cultural heritage.

Since 1972, The AWB Vincent American Ireland Fund Literary Award has established itself as one of the most important accolades given to Irish writers. Supported initially by Thomas F. O'Neil and family and since then by Maryon Davies Lewis, the Awards' honorees have been men and women of great artistry and creative skill whose work has given voice to Ireland's past and present, its delights and its sorrows. Since its inception, Award recipients have gathered an array of prestigious honors including, The Nobel Prize in Literature, The Man Booker Prize and Pulitzer Prize.

Fáilte Isteach Embodies the Spirit of

A Hundred Thousand Welcomes

to Ireland's New Communities





Mary Nally stood in the grocery store aisle and watched as the young mother from Argentina struggled to read the back of a can. "She had two small children with her, and was clearly frustrated at not being able to understand the label. My heart went out to her as I realized how isolating it must have been to not be able to read English."

That experience six years ago in the small village of Summerhill, Co. Meath was the beginning of a nationwide movement to teach English language skills to those who have come to Ireland from other countries. Mary Nally was CEO of Third Age, a national organization that works with older and retired people to remain engaged with their lives and their communities. She asked what role Third Age might take in helping people who wanted to learn.

"I came back to Third Age and shared the story with the volunteers here," said Mary. "So we began teaching conversational English. We put the word out in the community and on the first night we had twelve tutors and six students from Eastern Europe. Then, by word of mouth, it spread. It became so clear that there was a real need to make people feel welcome because Ireland has changed, especially within the last ten years. There are new communities of people who want to contribute."

The offer of free, friendly, conversation-based classes struck an immediate chord in the community and soon the number of students and tutors grew. While English classes are often taught in urban centers of Ireland, it was apparent that there were many non-English speakers living in rural areas who wished to learn English as well. This fact, paired with senior citizens with the time and desire to teach, created a perfect opportunity to address a previously unmet need.

Not surprisingly, the effect was positive not only for those who were learning, but for those who were teaching. "We find that the communities have become stronger," explained Liam Carey, Head of National Development for Fáilte Isteach. "The students begin to meet their neighbors. And our tutors learn about a world beyond Ireland while offering a valuable skill to the community."

Liam addressed the question of whether the current economic struggles in Ireland have made immigrants feel more, or less, welcomed by local communities. What message does Fáilte Isteach impart to those who may be unsure of these new arrivals? "At an economic level, it does not benefit a community if part of that community can't participate," explained Liam. "We want people to come and be able to contribute to society, not be



reliant upon it because they can't speak English. Diversity is a fact of life for Ireland today. A warm, friendly welcome has a positive impact on the existing community. We should all want to build a better society, a society where people don't feel alienated."

And so today, all across Ireland, neighbors are reaching out to neighbors. Fáilte Isteach has retained the program's personalized and friendly feel by encouraging small classes that use conversation as the primary teaching tool. The initiative has evolved to offer professional training to those who volunteer. Every week, over 550 trained tutors now teach over 1,400 students in 19 counties across Ireland. With help from The Ireland Funds Promising Ireland Campaign, the program has recently opened its 53rd branch. "Support from The Ireland Funds has meant we can sustain our growth throughout the country," explained Mary Nally. "Funding has made a real difference. It says that people see the value of our project and its impact. What I love about this project is that it works because of its simplicity. English is just a way to bring people together and it is life-changing. People tell us they are no longer isolated. They are no longer afraid to say hello. Parents don't depend on their children to translate. They become active citizens."

One example of an "active citizen" is Anna, a Fáilte Isteach student who came to Ireland from Poland speaking no English. "I was shy and embarrassed. I wanted to be independent and not rely on other people. And I wanted to meet Irish people. They are so friendly. They have open hearts. For those of us that are coming here, that makes all the difference. I learned about this program and thought, 'It's free, and so close to where I live!' I had taken another course but it was far from home, and it was expensive. Fáilte Isteach is so different. It's not just grammar, it is conversation. I feel comfortable asking about things I may not understand. I can ask anything here."

Anna is now giving back to her local community. "Last July, I opened a local business here in town. I didn't take a bank loan; I saved in order to open this. It's a tough time in Ireland and I want to do my small part to give back and provide jobs. I didn't come here to take, I came here to give. Thanks to Fáilte Isteach, I'm able to do that."

Q. Cillian, have you always had an interest in music? As a composer, how does music affect your life?

A. I have always loved listening to music. As a child, I would watch music videos and listen to CDs all day long. I attended a school for physical needs in Cork called Lavanagh where I first dabbled in writing lyrics and completed my first Fetac Level 3 in music appreciation. I found for the first time in my life I could express myself through writing lyrics. I joined Gráinne McHale in SoundOUT, and with her help and encouragement I came to see that I had a talent for this. She introduced me to Soundbeam® and I was able to perform alongside other musicians to different styles of music, which was exciting as I am disabled as well as nonverbal. I had just never imagined there was another world out there! When I hear my name I feel proud of myself. I still have to pinch myself when I am introduced as a "composer." Since I began composing, I find that I listen more intently to the words of the songs, especially if the song has any relevance to me or my life.

Q. How did you learn about Music Generation?

A. Gráinne introduced me to Music Generation and informed me of this exciting new initiative that would help young people to have access to music education in our own locality. It means a lot to have such an organization. Last year I wrote a song called "Equal" and was in the Knocknaheeney Youth Music Initiative, a band of young musicians in a local community who put music to my lyrics with the added bonus of me using Soundbeam® as an instrument. We even got to perform in the Áras for President McAleese. It was followed by some interviews in our local papers and I was on the local TV news; it was all very exciting.

Q . What has Music Generation done for your musical training and education?

A. Music Generation has given me the opportunity to perform my music locally. With the support of Music Generation, I can now access other training such as one-to-one songwriting lessons. This has meant a lot to me. I have also just started to write my own music with an iPad and application called Garageband. I struggle a bit as I can only use a head pointer to access the iPad. It is hard work but I love it and it

will help me achieve my dream: to write and/or perform my music with someone famous. I want to show people what can be done with determination.

Q. You had the opportunity to perform an original composition in front of visiting donors from The Ireland Funds during the Worldwide Ireland Funds Conference in Cork. What was that like?

A. That was a fantastic day! I usually get very nervous before a performance, but on that particular day, there was a warm feeling from the audience. I could feel they were enjoying it as much as we were. I was the last to perform when Grainne introduced me as the "composer" as well as a musician; I thought I would burst with pride. I loved every bit of that performance and wished I could go on playing. The reaction from the visitors was amazing and it will go down as one of my proudest moments.

Q. Where do you see your music education going? What are your plans for the future?

A. Now that Music Generation is on board, I feel confident that the resources will be there in order for me to continue with my music education. With big names like U2 and The Ireland Funds behind it, it's going to make such a difference. It will open up a whole new world to young musicians in Ireland. It can only encourage others like myself who may not have access to music because of their disabilities. Music Generation Ireland has helped to show the world that everyone is equal and deserves an opportunity to express themselves through music.

Q . Anything else you'd like to share?

A. I have been working the lyrics and music for a new song that I'm excited about. I hope to record it in the autumn. I must mention another very important person in my life—my personal assistant, Brian. He has been with me from the start of my music career and has become a very special friend to me and my family. He has helped me to start up a new venture called Cork Music Zone, an outlet run by volunteers to help young musicians. We just got news that Music Generation has donated an amplifier to get us started and I want to say "thank you."

The Forgotten Frish



The Ireland Funds have made caring for the "Forgotten Irish" a key focus area. Several chapters within the network now sponsor programs that are committed to supporting elderly Irish men and women. These programs provide access to a wide range of services and educational opportunities that tackle loneliness and isolation and improve quality of life.

It was The Ireland Fund of Great Britain that first actively identified the "Forgotten Irish" as a community of people in need. Most of the "Forgotten Irish," now elderly men and women originally from Ireland, came to Britain in the second half of the twentieth century, during one of the darkest and most impoverished periods of Ireland's history. The majority came to find work and sent billions of pounds home to their families. Thousands of others came to escape the hardship, marginalisation, or, all too often, the abuse of institutional life.

As the campaign approaches its five year anniversary, Basil Geoghegan, Co-Chair of The Ireland Fund of Great Britain's Board of Directors, offers this reflection on the impact of the campaign and the people it has touched.

The Ireland Fund of Great Britain

is looking forward to its 25th anniversary in 2013 and in that time has lived through many different chapters-the "Troubles", the London bombing campaign, the Good Friday Agreement and the peace that followed, the Celtic Tiger and Irish prosperity peaking with many trophy London properties being Irish owned up to the current fallout from the financial crisis.

As an organisation, the biggest challenge for us is to be relevant to Irish living in Britain, regardless of whether those are donors or beneficiaries, and whether the object of the philanthropy is in Great Britain or Ireland. Like many charities in Great Britain, our donors come from many sections of society with individual interests and who give to us in many different ways. Some may just throw coins in a bucket collection at tube stations on St Patrick's

Day. Then there are the Irish professionals working in the UK, second generation business people, family trusts, individuals whose charitable giving we handle on their behalf and adherents to The Worldwide Ireland Funds' diaspora of support.

Once Forgotten

It was during a time of plenty, when the difference between the haves and the have-nots was very pronounced, that we stumbled upon a cohort of emigrants who were literally forgotten. They were forgotten by friends, hidden from view, unknown to social services, and definitely forgotten by Ireland. These were the men and women who left Ireland in the 1950s in one of the deepest recessions ever. They took the boat to England, ending up working in hard manual labour, on building sites, on the roads and the railways. The women who made the same journey usually ended up in domestic service or working as nurses in the many training hospitals in London, Liverpool, and Birmingham. Not only did these people escape the harsh poverty of Ireland in the 1950s, but they also sent money home to ease the burden on the family left behind. Indeed, such was the impact of the funds they sent back to Ireland that they became known as the "Remittance Generation."

A Campaign is Born

Following this discovery, The Ireland Fund of Great Britain commissioned a study into this group to ensure that funding was secured that met demonstrated needs and allowed us later to measure the resulting impact. This is how the "Forgotten Irish" campaign was born. Since it was launched just five years ago, we have raised and distributed over £1M from this campaign. Funds have been dispersed to provide the widest possible scope to meet the needs of the "Forgotten Irish"-trained welfare workers who help the elderly access the pension and benefits to which they are entitled; lunch clubs to ensure that the most isolated have an opportunity to socialize with their peer group in a safe environment where they can raise concerns; return visits to Ireland for those who have become estranged from their families; and a wide variety of health and social welfare projects, including the victims of institutional abuse. As part of the campaign each year we present the "Forgotten Irish" Award to an individual or an organisation that has made a significant contribution to helping this group of people. This year, we were delighted to honour Sally Mulready and Phyllis Morgan for their work with survivors of abuse. Both Sally and Phyllis were raised in orphanages, and although neither suffered abuse, they have first-hand knowledge of what happened during those terrible times. They are both experts on the needs of survivors and The Ireland Fund of Great Britain has just signed an agreement to provide three years core funding to their organisation. President of Ireland Michael D Higgins appointed Sally to the Irish Council of State earlier this year—a fitting tribute to a woman who has spent her life working for the Irish in Great Britain.



IRISH ELDERLY ADVICE NETWORK

This grant was used to reach out to elderly and vulnerable Irish in East London where there is currently a lack of Irish services. This was done through newsletters and home visits and liaison with GPs.



IRISH WOMEN'S SURVIVORS SUPPORT NETWORK

This group was created to help female survivors of institutional abuse, who now live in the UK. It empowers these women through information and the support of other women who have had similar experiences.



ST MICHAEL'S IRISH CENTRE

This grant was used to extend the information and advice service in Liverpool by offering a drop-in centre, where pensioners can drop in for a cup of tea and get advice on housing and pensions, etc. at the same time.

We go through a rigorous grant application process to ensure that we only support organisations that are meeting identified needs and can provide us with regular reports on the impact donors' contributions make. We offer our supporters many ways to become involved from fundraising balls, sporting lunches, regular giving, large gifts that are restricted to particular programmes or organisations. We also work with schools as we introduce fundraising to the next generation of "Forgotten Irish" campaign supporters.

Modeled on a similar competition at Harvard Business School, The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition requires teams to pitch their business plans before a panel of distinguished entrepreneurs and executives. Business plans were assessed based on criteria ranging from market potential of the idea to the tasks and milestones required for implementation.

Lukas Decker from University College Dublin was the winner with his business plan that introduced "Coindrum," an innovative plan to exchange unwanted loose coins from airline travelers in exchange for vouchers that can be redeemed at duty-free shops. Mr. Decker took home the top prize of €10,000, with first and second runners-up receiving prize money of €5,000 and €1,000, respectively. In addition, teams selected to represent their universities were able to complete a masterclass in pitching, delivered by the DCU Ryan Academy, which was established to promote an entrepreneurial mindset and innovation focus among existing Irish businesses and start-ups through training, supports, and finance.

Announcing the winner, William S. McKiernan, chair of the judging panel and founder of CyberSource Corporation said, "The judging panel was so impressed with the high quality of business plans and pitches from all nine universities. I congratulate all of the finalists for developing such innovative and compelling business plans and thank them for the role they will play as Ireland's next generation of business leaders."



No Mind Left Behind


No Mind Left Behind is an initiative developed by The Ireland Funds and longtime supporters John and Pauline Ryan to give promising young people from low-income households the opportunity to complete third-level education by offering an annual scholarship to cover additional costs.

Basic university tuition fees are, at present, paid by the Irish government, but students from lower income families are often prevented from completing further education due to the cost of books, accommodation, transportation and subsistence, which are estimated at \$4,000 per year (about \$100 per week) or \$16,000 total for attendance at a typical four-year university.

Donors can select the city, county, secondary school or university in Ireland to which they would like the scholarship to be awarded. The Ireland Funds are pleased to confirm that 20 scholarships have been committed by our donors and that the first awards will be made in September 2012.


IN THE LAND OF THE GIANTS, EVERYONE IS EQUAL


A program with roots in Canada that uses hockey to empower children from disadvantaged neighborhoods is now making a difference to communities in Northern Ireland. The Giant H.E.R.O.S. program bridges community divides and offers children from high-risk and economically challenged areas in Belfast and Dublin a chance to interact and learn about one another. By bringing them together over the neutral sport of hockey, the program is teaching kids that teamwork and discipline can transcend fear and misconceptions.

Belfast has become the natural hub of the program as it has two ice rinks including the Odyssey Arena, home of the Belfast Giants pro hockey team. The Belfast Giants' motto is "In the land of the Giants, everyone is equal." The team believes that as a non-sectarian sport, the game of hockey can play a role in bringing diverse communities together.

The Belfast Giants Community Foundation has supported the Giant H.E.R.O.S. program. In a program sponsored in part by The Ireland Funds, over 30 young people from Catholic and Protestant neighborhoods in Belfast, disadvantaged neighborhoods in Dublin and Holywood Army Barracks come together each year for a camp experience with the Belfast Giants team. Teambuilding activities include the development of hockey skills (culminating in a final game held at the Odyssey Arena), DVD production, swimming, and workshops around the four Giant H.E.R.O.S. pillars: discipline, respect, listening, and fun. In addition, the participants meet throughout the year to further foster the interactions between young people.

"The Giants really believe in the ability of this program to change lives. By developing the experiences of young people today, we will encourage them to grow as people and help build a vibrant and peaceful society in the future," said Todd Kelman, Belfast Giants General Manager.

COMMUNITIES COMING TOGETHER

The Ireland Funds have been involved with many cross-community and cross-border programs in Northern Ireland. Donors to The Ireland Funds are familiar with various initiatives that bring Catholic and Protestant children together including PeacePlayers International, Northern Ireland Children's Enterprise, and Cooperation Ireland. In addition to bringing Protestant and Catholic children together from various neighborhoods, the H.E.R.O.S. program has focused on a third and often-forgotten group of children in Northern Ireland: the youth living in the local Holywood Army Barracks whose parents are British military personnel stationed in Belfast.

Ken McQuillan, Brigade Welfare Support Officer for Northern Ireland, explained, "The unique position that our personnel find themselves in is that they have largely gone unnoticed since the Peace Process and essentially still live 'behind the wire' with a sense of marginalization and isolation. So in addition to kids from Dublin and Belfast neighborhoods, the Giant H.E.R.O.S program reaches out to these kids from the barracks and says 'you are welcome here."

The Giant H.E.R.O.S. program has come a long way in bringing families together from all communities. Early on, the program had to convince families this was something their children could enjoy and get behind because of misplaced fears and misconceptions. Today, over 100 children have gone through the program and it has a waiting list of over 200 more who want to be involved.

DAY ONE

The Young Leaders discussed issues of governance, membership, communications and engagement throughout the four day event that started with a reception at the host hotel, The Fitzpatrick Grand Central, where the Young Leaders were welcomed to New York by City Council Speaker, Christine Quinn who addressed the group and talked about the kindred bond between New York City and Ireland.

DAY TWO

Day two began with the group attending a breakfast at the New York Stock Exchange, with an address by NYSE/Euronext CEO Duncan Niederauer, who spoke about his personal connection to the Fund as both a Board Director and a former Dinner Chairman. DAY THREE

Day three featured a two-session business brunch sponsored by Board Director John Duffy at the exclusive CORE Club with a presentation by fellow Board Director John Fitzpatrick. John's speech was followed by breakout sessions to discuss how the Young Leaders would operate from a global standpoint, going forward. Following the session, the Young Leaders enjoyed dinner at Soho House, with a round table discussion hosted by Bloomberg's Margaret Brennan and featuring Sean Love of The Ireland Fund's supported project "Fighting Words"; New York Congressman Joe Crowley; Aidan Connolly of The Irish Arts Center in New York; New York Times bestselling author, Colum McCann, and NY Young Leader entrepreneur, Shane Naughton. The discussion revolved around the Irish identity, Philanthropy and the future image of "brand Ireland."

DAY FOUR

Day four began with a visit to the remarkable Irish Hunger Memorial in Battery Park City. The Summit completed with a casual brunch session at the Dubliner, where the Young Leaders downloaded the positive outcomes of the weekend, and agreed to immediately put in place a quarterly conference call to continue the conversation and strengthen the global network that was launched in New York. This will lead to the next task which is setting up a global advisory structure with a key Young Leader volunteer serving in each market. The group also agreed to gather again in County Cork at The Ireland Funds Conference in late June and to have round two of the Global Young Leaders Summit.

The Summit closed with the key announcement that the Young Leaders pledged to raise over \$1 million for The Ireland Funds Promising Ireland Campaign. The Campaign is The Ireland Funds' initiative to assist charitable organizations in Ireland meet the challenge of an increased demand for their services at a time of major funding reductions. President and CEO of The Worldwide Ireland Funds Kieran McLoughlin said, "The announcement demonstrates amazing generosity from people in the early stages of their professional careers. Their commitment to the future of the diaspora and also to developing philanthropy in Ireland is tremendous."













A Day of Strategy and an Evening of Celebration

The day began with the Plenary Session where supporters heard from Ireland Funds leadership about the progress of the Promising Ireland Campaign and plans to come. Hugo MacNeill, the Chairman of The Ireland Funds in Ireland, first spoke to the group about the impact that the Promising Ireland Campaign had made to so many organizations in Ireland.

Kieran McLoughlin, President & CEO of The Worldwide Ireland Funds, then delivered the big announcement of the day. Those gathered already knew that the Promising Ireland Campaign had smashed through its original goal of raising \$100 million for charities, 19 months ahead of the campaign's end. Kieran announced that the Board of Directors had approved the increase of the Campaign's goal to \$140 million to be raised by the end of 2013. The announcement was met resolve and enthusiasm by those gathered.

Caitriona Fottrell, Vice President, spoke about the impact of the latest grant round. Over 900 applications had been received from organizations seeking funding. The grant round, core to the mission of The Ireland Funds, was the largest ever in the history of the organization and would deliver much-needed support to over 150 worthy organizations doing work on the ground.

After the Plenary Session, over 60 Young leaders gathered for an afternoon of planning. Young Leaders from every chapter were present to hear an update on the program. Pat Tully, National Director of the Young Leaders and Caitlin Duffy, Irish Young Leader Director, kicked off the session by providing an update on the program since the Inaugural Young Leaders Summit in January. The session included an update on the Young Leaders \$1.35 million fundraising goal by the end of 2013. The group was delighted to learn they are 1/3 of the way there just five months since setting the target at their summit in NYC.

The evening capped off with the highlight event of the Conference: the Gala dinner at the famous Ballymaloe House in Shanagarry. The buzz had been building for days about the arrival of former US President Bill Clinton. President Clinton had travelled to Cork to attend the evening along with An Taoiseach Enda Kenny to celebrate the progress of the *Promising Ireland* Campaign.

Loretta Brennan Glucksman, Chairman of The American Ireland Fund, introduced Nobel Laureate and longtime friend of The Ireland Funds, Seamus Heaney. She recapped that Seamus had been the second recipient of The American Ireland Fund AWB Vincent Literary Award many years ago. Loretta added a personal note to the evening by reading a poem that had been written for her by Seamus Heaney. Seamus Heaney recalled his own career as a struggling poet and the difference receiving The Ireland Fund's Literary Award made to him as he established his reputation. He shared that he had taken great joy being associated with the program for 40 years and seeing new and emerging artists who were encouraged and supported.

Supporters retired late that evening to the Knight's Bar at Castlemartyr for a terrific sing-song and after-party, in true Irish style.

DAY THREE

Enjoying the Beauty of Cork

The final day of the Conference began with terrific coverage in Ireland's news outlets about the *Promising Ireland* Campaign and the impact it was having for hundreds of charities across Ireland and beyond.

It was also a day of relaxation and an opportunity for visitors to see some of the highlights of the Cork area. Golfers teed off at the esteemed golf course of Old Head. Another group visited the Midleton Distillery and learned the steps in Irish whiskey making. Lastly, a group went to Lismore Castle, an ancient Irish estate. Lord Burlington, son of the Duke of Devonshire and resident of the castle, joined the group to provide a private tour.

Later that evening, Chairman Loretta Brennan Glucksman opened her home—East Grove House—as the venue for the closing dinner of the Conference. Loretta spoke eloquently about the importance and "specialness" of the gathering, about the good work that was being done by The Ireland Funds, and of her hope that the group would gather again a year from now. The Irish National anthem was sung with emotion by the group, closing the Conference on a high and emotional note.

THE IRELAND FUNDS WINEGEESE SOCIETY VISITS BURGUNDY, THE CÔTE D'OR, AND PARIS

FOR SEVEN DAYS IN JUNE, the WineGeese explored Burgundy while staying in the charming Hôtel Le Cep in the medieval heart of Beaune, its wine capital. Beaune with its cobbled streets, sumptuously tiled roofs, charming restaurants and antique shops, made a perfect base for our exploration. We were guided through the intricacies of the region by the great Clive Coates, MW—one of the most respected and entertaining wine authorities in the world. WineGeese members will know Coates for *The Vine*, his independent fine wine magazine, which ran from 1984 to 2005, back issues of which continue to be in high demand. His books are widely considered the classic works on their respective subjects including *Côte d'Or*, A Celebration of the Great Wines of Burgundy and the newly released *The Wines of Burgundy*.

We explored the Côte d'Or, that 35-mile stretch running from Dijon in the north to Chagny in the south including the revered white Burgundies of the Côte de Beaune—Domaine Olivier Leflaive Frères, Château de Meursault, and Bouchard Père et Fils; the reds of the Côte de Beaune including Maison Louis Jadot who are in charge of producing the beautiful wines of the Domaine Duchesse de Magenta, an original WineGeese family; lunching at Domaine Senard with our host the Comte du Senard. We finished at Domaine Chandon de Briailles with a private tasting guided by proprietor and winemaker Claude de Nicolay; the reds of the Côte de Nuits at Domaine Faiveley, then toured with proprietor Jean Grivot at Domaine Ponsot, Comte Georges de Vogüé, Domaine Drouhin-Laroze where we were guided by proprietors and winemaker Philippe Drouhin and his wife Christine, and Domaine de la Vougeraie with winemaker Pierre Vincent.

We spent a magical evening at Château de Sully, the ancestral home of Maurice de MacMahon, Marshal of France, the first elected President of the French republic, Duke of Magenta, and descendent of the MacMahon family of Limerick. Our hostess, the Duchess of Magenta guided us through this Renaissance jewel and its fascinating Irish connections.

The 4th Duke of Magenta came under the spell of the Abbey of Morgeot and its vines in the village of Chassagne-Montrachet. Today, the premier wines are produced by Louis Jadot for the **Domaine Duchesse de Magenta**.

Our tour concluded with our return to Paris for a WineGeese dinner at the Irish Embassy hosted by **HE Paul Kavanagh**, the Irish Ambassador to France. Honorary WineGeese member Thierry Gardinier of **Château Phélan Ségur** joined us in what is fast becoming a most treasured WineGeese tradition. The evening was made even more memorable with pianist Michael McHale's recital on a piano that had been generously provided by The Ireland Fund of France.

The WineGeese will take flight again in October 2013 to discover the delights to be found in the Napa and Sonoma Valleys.





Breaking all records the 2012 Gala was the most successful event in the Funds' 37 year history and contributed \$4.2 million to the Promising Ireland Campaign.



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

Leadership Forum with The Hon. Aidan Cronin, Irish Consul General

APRIL, 2012 THE HON. The Singapore Ireland Fund celebrates St Patrick's Day with the Down Syndrome Association of Singapore

MARCH, 2012 Singapore and Ireland have a long history of cultural ties and close relations since the early 1800s. Countless Singaporeans have been educated by Irish teachers in Singapore, or through universities in Ireland. The Singapore Ireland Fund is dedicated to using its powerful network to support aims which strengthen The Singapore Ireland relationship and causes which honor the common Asian and Irish values of education, cultural and community relations. Since its incorporation in 2009, The Singapore Ireland Fund (SIF) has met and surpassed its fund raising targets every year, raising more than S\$1.5 million to date. Projects have included the Irish Chamber Orchestra's trip to Singapore in June 2010 where they worked with Singapore's Ministry of Community, Youth and Sports to promote music as a tool for community engagement. The SIF has sponsored a Singaporean Scholar to study this subject in Limerick in 2012. The Singapore Ireland Fund donated \$\$200,000 in 2011 to fund the establishment of a new enrichment Centre for the Down Syndrome Association (Singapore). The new Centre is now under construction, and will promote 'growth' and development of the person with Down syndrome, with the goal of achieving increased self-esteem and social integration by way of creative expression, and enhancing their quality of life. The Down Syndrome Association of Singapore is developing ties with their counterparts at DSA Ireland to share experience on enrichment programmes, and is now working closely with various Irish groups in Singapore. Members and friends of Down Syndrome Association (Singapore) celebrated World Down Syndrome Day 2012 by joining the St Patrick's Day Parade on Sunday 18 March. The parade is South East Asia's only St Patrick's Day Parade and drew a crowd of over 3,000 festively-dressed revellers despite a heavy downpour. Guests-of-Honour for the event were Mr Sam Tan, Singapore's Senior Parliamentary Secretary for Community Development, Youth and Sports, and Foreign Affairs, and Mr Brendan Howlin, the Irish Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform.

You Call This Work?

What did I know about Monaco before I went there? I had two overlapping ideas. One was all the clichés. Tiny. Overcrowded. Tax refuge. Gambling. Gin palaces. Monte Carlo. The other was a dream of innocent glamour.

Myth means that which is spoken but my myth was that which is sung, in this case a corny old song made famous by Charles Coborn called The Man who Broke the Bank at Monte Carlo. Decades ago, in the depths of rural Ireland I listened enthralled as my father sang it, (now, he was a gambler) and I fell in love with the idea of Monaco, its unattainable glamour. So I had a childish image of a fabulous place later overlain by the current negative perceptions.

What I found was a place entirely to my liking. The people I met there were busy, mannerly, and generous. I explored the charming old town up on the rock, enjoyed the impeccability of the principality, its order, and its brilliant transport. I loved my daily journey to work in a boat across the harbor, and walking alongside the Mediterranean. Who could ask for more? Me. I ate regularly in La Montgolfiere a delicious restaurant and now have a pudding named after me. Polly Pudding? Hmmm...

I relished every minute of my stay which was due to the generosity of The Ireland Fund of Monaco which awarded me a Residential Bursary at the Princess Grace Irish Library near the Palace, in a congenial room lined with first editions of Irish books plus the invaluable help of the administrator Judith Gantley (who became a friend) and Géraldine Lance, and her never ending patience, plus, yes plus an apartment overlooking a farmer's market where I did all my shopping, buying my courgettes in France and my salad in Monaco. So cosmopolitan! I felt blessed and creative. I owe a great debt of gratitude to everyone concerned. And I actually did what I came for. I wrote—and wrote. I have the next book to prove it.



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
