The Worldwide Ireland Funds have exceeded the original Promising Ireland Campaign goal of \$100 million and will achieve \$150 million by its close at the end of 2013.



The Worldwide Ireland Funds launched the Promising Ireland Campaign to raise \$100 million by the end of 2013 on behalf of Irish charities and causes worldwide. The original goal was exceeded early in 2012 and a new goal of \$140 million was set. To achieve this, The Ireland Funds had to raise \$1 million a month.

This goal also has been exceeded thanks to donors' generosity and the Campaign total will be over \$150 million by the closing date. With 150% of the original goal raised, It is remarkable that one third of The Worldwide Ireland Funds total earnings since foundation in 1976 have been raised during the five years of the Campaign.

# WHEN MAEVE'S HUSBAND KEN PASSED AWAY, HER LIFE CAME TO A SCREECHING HALT.

"Ken was taken from me twenty years ago and I just shut the door," says Maeve, age 82. "I gave up going anywhere. I stopped talking to my neighbors and this lasted for a couple years. I loved my family to bits but I was just so depressed."

Depression and isolation in older people is not uncommon in Ireland. The issue of isolation is particularly significant in Dun Laoghaire Rathdown which has the highest national percentage of people over 65 years: 14.5% in comparison to the national average of 11.2%. "The burden of loneliness is actually bigger than concerns about financial issues," explains Mary O'Donohue, Executive Director of Making Connections. "We have seen instances of older people admit themselves to the hospital just to alleviate their loneliness."


Making Connections was established in 2009 to facilitate connections between people of different generations. Each situation and friendship is unique. It might be as simple as going for a walk, or showing an older person how to Skype with their family overseas. Some share literature, movies, or singing as a common interest. Volunteers come from all walks of life: students, professionals, retired people, and go through training and background checks before they begin volunteering.

The once-a-week visits tackle loneliness and extend an extra support system that often allows older people to remain independent in their own homes. In other instances it may be a visit to a person in a nursing home who has been referred because they do not receive many visitors. Mary is quick to point out that it is not a replacement for home help or family; it is a relationship where people exchange wisdom, life experience and skills. "Everyone needs to feel that someone cares. For many older people, a volunteer is a life line and for some it is a life saver."

Older people are referred to the program often by medical professionals who are concerned about the effect of isolation on their health. "In the midst of my depression, my nurse suggested that I consider getting involved with Making Connections," continues Maeve as she sits in her small sun-filled living room in Stillorgan. "They asked me if I would like someone to come visit me once a week for an hour. Well, I didn't know what they'd be like, but Cliona came and she raised something inside me. I was amazed to find someone who was interested in my stories. I asked her 'what is a young girl like you doing spending time with an old woman like me?' but she says she loves it and I thoroughly look forward to her visits."

Maeve's volunteer is Cliona, age 25, and her take on their friendship affirms the program's objective that the service offer a two-way benefit. "Six months ago I met Maeve and frankly, she's totally changed my opinion of older people. She loves talking about fashion and I get loads of ideas from her. She is such an open and friendly person that once we get to talking, I find that an hour isn't enough. We discovered we both love old movies and I often stay well into the evening. "

The Ireland Funds identified Making Connections as a project worthy of support for the profound difference it is making in the lives of the older community. "The Ireland Funds understood that for a young charity like Making Connections, it can be a real difficulty to get noticed," says Mary. "We received our first funding through their Grant Round in 2012 which was followed by a Donor Advised Gift in 2013 which made a big difference to us. It was a crucial moment because we were moving into the winter months with a long list of older people hoping for a volunteer. The funding allowed us to meet this need of recruiting, training and supporting volunteers."

# **Business Plan Competition**

**BUSINESS AND EDUCATION LEADERS** FROM IRELAND AND THE US GATHERED AT THE GUINNESS ENTERPRISE CENTRE THE SECOND ANNUAL FUNDS BUSINESS PLAN COMPETITION. SIX TEAMS FROM IRELAND AND NORTH-ERN IRELAND WERE SHORTLISTED FROM OVER 60 APPLICANTS TO PITCH THEIR INNOVATIVE BUSINESS PLANS PANEL OF ENTREPRENEURS, EXECUTIVES AND INVESTORS. THE COMPETITION IS **FUNDED** BY **PHILANTHROPIC** FROM AMERICAN IRELAND FUND BOARD DIRECTOR BILL MCKIERNAN.

Modeled on a similar competition at Harvard Business School, each team's pitch is assessed based on criteria ranging from market potential of the idea to the tasks and milestones required for implementation. "Every job starts with an entrepreneur," said Bill McKiernan, Chair of the judging panel and Founder of CyberSource Corporation. "If we can encourage entrepreneurship in Ireland then it can go some way to helping create jobs. By hosting a national business plan for young people and exposing them to people who have been successful entrepreneurs, we will try to give them some confidence in starting a business and assure them that it's okay to fail."

Ollwyn Moran, a post-graduate student at NUI Maynooth, won the 2013 Competition for Creeper Crawlers, a babysuit that aids neurological development in babies with grips that encourage crawling, a crucial developmental stage for babies. Ms Moran took home the top prize of €10,000, with first and second runners-up receiving prize money of €5,000 and €1,000 respectively. In addition, shortlisted teams completed a training programme that helped them to develop their business plans and to create a competitive pitch. Sponsored by Bank of Ireland, with additional support from the Guinness Enterprise Centre, the training programme was delivered by the DCU Ryan Academy, which was established to promote an entrepreneurial mindset and innovation focus among existing Irish businesses and start-ups through training, supports and finance. "The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition is all about supporting the planning process and promoting confidence among the finalist teams," said Alan Foy of Blueface, one of the judges. "We look forward to supporting [the teams], giving them feedback and a network to connect with on the entrepreneurial journey. Networks of advice are vital."

etween June and August, the bookshops, tearooms and restaurants of Bantry, including the storied Bantry House, are filled with audiences who come to enjoy world-renowned musicians playing classical and traditional music. In addition, critically-acclaimed authors from around the world make their way to this corner of West Cork to offer readings, seminars and workshops to all ages in celebration of all that

is literary. The West Cork Chamber Music Festival in particular has grown from a small gathering to being regarded as one of the leading festivals of its kind in Europe.

Francis Humphrys, Chief Executive of West Cork Music, has a deep passion for the music and literary gifts that Bantry offers the thousands of festival attendees each year. He is a founder of West Cork Music and each year devotedly authors hundreds of pages of detailed guides that have come to be cherished by Festival visitors. But his passion does not stop at Mozart, Haydn or Beethoven. One of the aspects he is most excited about is the proven economic impact that the festivals have had for this part of Ireland. "Especially in rural areas of Ireland, you find communities struggling," says Humphrys. "We are proud to say that here in Cork, we see the difference that West Cork Music is making.

The Festivals have not only created jobs, but continue to bring investment and much-needed income to this area of Ireland."

In 2012, an economic impact survey administered by University College Cork showed that for every €200,000 invested, the economic return to the community was between five and six times that amount. With thousands of visitors attending the festivals and as many as 30% of the visitors to the Chamber Music Festival coming from overseas, the hotels and restaurants are full during the summer season thanks to West Cork Music. This success has also been shown in attendance that continues to increase each year.

West Cork Music also organizes year-round programs in Cork schools. Tuning Up is their initiative which brings children access to top musicians and broadens their exposure to all styles of music with an interactive and engaging approach. West Cork Music has brought Tuning Up to 50 schools.

Over the years, The Ireland Funds have assisted West Cork Music through both Donor Advised gifts—including the Mary Daly Fund—and The Ireland Funds Grant Round. In 2012 a grant was made to the Masters of Tradition Festival and most recently, funding was provided for the West Cork Literary Festival. The work of West Cork Music is proof that long-term investment in cultural initiatives can bring long-term benefits to local communities.

BRINGING MUCH-NEEDED QUALITY CARE TO THE PEOPLE OF COUNTY WICKLOW

### It is said, "You cannot be born or die in County Wicklow."

With no medical facility there, residents have traditionally had to travel outside the county to receive medical care including hospice care.

The Wicklow Hospice believes that no one should face death or bereavement without the care and support they need. They are working to achieve dignity, comfort and choice for all people facing the end of life. When death is imminent, a very special type of support is needed. Traditionally, even if patients from Wicklow could get a bed in a Dublin hospice, family and friends still had to travel to spend their last days with them. People who had witnessed loved ones in their final stages of life having to travel for support when they had so little time left, realized a facility in Wicklow was urgent. Volunteers formed Wicklow Hospice Foundation in 2009 with the aim of bringing a hospice facility to Co. Wicklow.

Today, the people of Wicklow are celebrating thanks to the county's most famous resident—the recently crowned three-time winner of the Academy Award for Best Actor-Daniel Day-Lewis.

A magnificent site has been donated by the Columban Sisters at Magheramore Brittas Bay. Daniel Day-Lewis came on board as a Patron of the Wicklow Hospice in 2009 after experiencing the excellent care his mother received in a cottage hospital in England during the final months of her life. He spoke movingly of this experience when he attended The American Ireland Fund 2013 New York Dinner Gala as the surprise guest.

Daniel donated the international premiere of Lincoln the movie, starring himself as Abraham Lincoln and directed by Steven Spielberg, to help raise funds to fund this long-awaited hospice facility. The Wicklow Hospice is preparing to break ground to officially open the new facility in 2014.

THE DIFFERENCE A HOSPICE IN WICKLOW WILL MAKE

### Marie's Story

After two days of her terminally ill mother not eating or drinking, Marie Kindlon still remembers as clear as day the words spoken to her by a consultant as she sought some sort of assistance for her dying mother.

### "There is no palliative care in Wicklow."

Marie and her family were fortunate enough to secure a bed in at a hospice in Dublin, 60 miles from their home in Arklow. The family was relieved to be in a position to afford the opportunity for her to end out her last days with dignity. But still, the daily travel to Dublin was stressful.

However, it still rankles that owing to the fact that there was no hospital facility in Co. Wicklow, the family could not give their mother her dying wish: to end her last few days at home.

Despite what Marie had to cope with, she knows that other families had to deal with even more harrowing situations, and, in a way, considers herself lucky. Other families travel even farther, depending on where the nearest hospice bed can be found.

"We had the means to be able to travel up and down every day to see Mammy and spend time together as a family. Tragically, there are dying people in acute hospitals waiting for family members to travel huge distances to come and visit them, knowing that they are dying."

### Evanne's Story

"My own mother also had a most peaceful death thanks to hospice care. She had terminal cancer and the home care team came every day to see her and help with pain control. Nothing was too much trouble. For her final 12 hours on earth, she went into the hospice. The love, compassion and care that was shown not only to my mother but to all of us, her family was my inspiration for becoming involved in The Wicklow Hospice Foundation. My mission is to try and get the same level of care for everyone with a terminal illness, at a time when they are so frightened and vulnerable. Having experienced it firsthand, I know the incalculable difference this made for both my mother and the whole family."

## Designed with Dignity

THE FUTURE WICKLOW HOSPICE BUILDING

So many people have to be considered when providing care for the terminally ill – the dying person, the family and the staff. End of life experiences can be harrowing and emotional for so many of those involved. The aim of the physical building is to make it as comfortable and kind an experience as possible for all.

Wicklow Hospice Foundation have put huge time and effort into researching and designing the hospice building to ensure it is sympathetic to the ethos of hospice care: to allow people to live out their final days in comfort and dignity. The design will avoid institutional appearance and aims to create a small scale feel inside. It will be a "home from home." Patients and families will have privacy and consideration will be made for the needs of younger family members. Staff will have space to not only work but to address the sensitivities

The beautiful scenery of the County Wicklow site overlooking the sea will be exploited as much as possible so patients can enjoy the uplifting views. Dr. Cuddihy, Chairman of the Wicklow Hospice Foundation explains,

around this nature of care.

"The vital new 12-bed facility will provide a specialist service for end of life care, respite, day-care facilities and outpatient clinics for symptom control. It will also provide a program of palliative and supportive care services providing physical, psychological, social, and spiritual care for patients, their families, and other loved ones."

"Where possible, patients should be provided with a sunny aspect and a good view to the outside. We hope to have same level double door access to a cloistered outdoor area where their beds can be wheeled out into the air if they so desire. Small alcoves, sunny corners, strategic use of clusters of seats both indoor and outdoor should be included to allow patients whose mobility may be limited to take short walks. It should function efficiently as a healthcare facility but have a homey feel."

ust over 20 years ago, a young man from Chicago, named Christopher Keeley, came to Ireland on a holiday and visited Trinity College Dublin. Like many who walk through the shadows of Front Arch for the first time into the light and expanse of Parliament Square, he was struck by the beauty of the place and felt he might one day like to return as a student of this historic university.

Sadly, some time afterwards, Christopher died, but even in their devastating loss his family decided they wanted to do some special things to honour his memory.

One of those things was to establish The Christopher L. Keeley Memorial Scholarship Fund to provide students with talent and ability, but restricted means, with the opportunity to study and fulfil their potential in Trinity College Dublin.

Celebrating its 20th anniversary this year, the Trinity Access Programme (TAP) is Trinity's flagship initiative aimed at opening up access to university for low income students and helping them overcome the barriers they face to fulfilling their educational goals. TAP has been the beneficiary of the

Christopher L. Keeley Memorial Scholarship Fund since 2002 and from that time there have been seven Keeley scholars who have entered the University through TAP, studying mainly in the areas of Business, Economics, Law and the Social Sciences. Two of the Keeley Scholars, David Nolan and Anthony Gaskin, are now graduates and pursuing successful careers in equity trading and in law respectively.

Following a visit by John and Barbara Keeley to Trinity in June of this year while attending The Worldwide Ireland Funds Conference, the Keeley Family Foundation is increasing its commitment to ten students in 2013. This is a wonderful boost for TAP and ensures a wider 'ripple effect' on the families, schools, and communities of these talented students for the long-term.

The Ireland Funds, Trinity Access Programme and Trinity College Dublin are immensely grateful to the Keeley family for their generous commitment and for their imaginative philanthropy which is making such a difference to so many lives.

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# CORK PENNY DINNERS

An Open Door. A Warm Welcome.
A Hot Meal.

If you blink, you miss it. A small door located on a side street just a few hundred feet from the River Lee. But once you find the wooden sign on Little Hanover Street and catch the welcoming smell of roast turkey, you'll find your way to the compassionate and delicious work of Cork Penny Dinners.



ork Penny Dinners is one of the oldest charity organizations in Cork. Established in the 1840s to assist those affected by the Famine, it has remained a beacon of hope in Cork. In an atmosphere of warmth and support, the kitchen's volun-

teers produce meals for hungry people in Cork 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

"We believe everyone has a place in this world," says Catriona Twomey, longtime volunteer and all-around "mother hen" at Cork Penny Dinners. "Our job here is to make that place welcoming and warm. We ask no questions. We pass no judgment. We're here to look after them."

Regardless of their ability to pay, guests begin arriving in the morning and continue to come throughout the day and into the evening. The door is open and there are fresh flowers on the table. There is no set time for people to come or go and the delicious hot meals are provided as needed. One of the first things you notice is the comfortable camaraderie that exists between the volunteers and the guests. Jokes are exchanged, coffee is passed hand-to-hand, and conversation flows easily between those at the tables and those in the kitchen. In the face of the hard times, everyone there appreciates this positive place and what it brings to the community.

Lately, the hard times have become harder. "Just two years ago we were serving 150 meals over the course of five days a week," says Catriona. "With the recession and the hard times, we're now open every day and serving over 1,000 meals a week.

And the people coming in have changed. Now it's families, younger people, and mothers with children. So we're not only offering hot meals here, but now preparing meals to take-out for those who don't wish to bring children inside. The need has really increased and we're bursting at the seams." Cork Penny Dinners hopes to relocate its space in order to accommodate the increased demand for its services. Its current location has very little storage and no central heating, remaining almost unchanged for decades. The organization is currently fundraising for a new facility and is more than half-way to their funding goals.

Cork Penny Dinners relies entirely on voluntary contributions to operate. Funding from The Ireland Funds Promising Ireland Campaign is helping Cork Penny Dinners continue its mission for the people of Cork.







# HABITAT for HUMANITY NORTHERN IRELAND

Building More Than Just Homes.

# Building Hope.



he Ireland Funds have been supporters of Habitat for Humanity Northern Ireland for many years. Donors have visited and volunteered their time and hammers to raise homes and bridge communities. Here, Chief Executive Jenny Williams shares a report on how that work is adapting in order to further Habitat for Humanity's mission in Northern Ireland.

Since 1994, Habitat Northern Ireland has been committed to building a shared future for Northern Ireland by bringing volunteers from across our communities together; delivering real impacts in places where division has left deep scars. Habitat has been a catalyst in breaking down social and religious barriers, building social cohesion and new relationships; building homes, building communities, building hope.

Support from The Ireland Funds has been both an important encouragement and vital enabler of our work; 20,000 volunteers; 100 homes; 9 neighborhoods where Habitat has helped change the future.

These last couple of years have been a real struggle for Habitat NI as we have navigated our way through a changing environment, and for Northern Ireland where too many people continue to cling to the past. In poverty division remains almost absolute, and the legacy of our past has been very visible most recently as people protest over flags-ugly protests uncovering the deep divisions which, despite all the positive progress, remain.

Building new homes for ownership in the middle of the worst recession for years just isn't possible so there were mixed feelings when we dedicated our Templemore Avenue homes last August. But the heart of our work has always been about more than houses.



We have seen over and over that when people work together on a practical project real change is possible. As we continue to bring people together to help build a shared future we build community and hope. Working in partnership with local homeless charity, Simon Community, we are able to continue to make a real impact for people in need locally and more than 200 young people come together every year as part of our Schools Programme which challenges young people to play their part in changing the future.

In challenging economic times and with an increasing need to be environmentally sustainable we have opened the first Habitat ReStore in Europe, in Lisburn. Just 6 months in and sales, donations and volunteers are already exceeding our expectations. The ReStore is a new hub for our work; a place where the community meet together; a place where low income families are able to improve their homes at a price they can afford and where new relationships are being

nurtured through intentional volunteer programmes. We have 45 volunteers from across the community working every week. We have been focused on providing opportunities for vulnerable or marginalized young people; giving them new skills, partnering them with 'buddies' retired volunteers who have so much to give; working together to build community capacity and confidence.

There are plenty of challenges, we need to be more sustainable and in the meantime we need more support but we see real progress and seeing people change brings real joy.

Hope has not gone away, in all of this we see a clear path for peacebuilders—almost as if the ugliness on our streets is deepening the desire in many people for this place to have a different future.

We need continued support as we continue to deliver real impacts through practical engagement, serving those in need, reaching across the divisions to build a shared future for our land.

# FORÓIGE'S NETWORK FOR TEACHING ENTREPRENEURSHIP

THE IRELAND FUNDS ARE HELPING IRELAND'S YOUNGEST ENTREPRENEURS BUILD BUSINESS, ACADEMIC AND LIFE SKILLS.

Historically, the five P's of marketing have been taught as, "Product, Price, Promotion, Place and People." Foróige's Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship is ensuring that Ireland's children learn a few more such as Pride, Purpose and Possibility. Foróige is Ireland's leading youth organization operating in 26 counties in Ireland. Working with almost 60,000 young people age 10-18 they connect Ireland's young people with clubs, projects and mentoring. Their Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship (NFTE) is an entrepreneurship education and development program that was first established in the US and brought to Ireland in 2004. It develops business skills and enterprise among young people teaching them not only to develop their own business ideas, but to tap into their confidence and potential to succeed along the way.





"Being in business as a young person is brilliant. NFTE taught me how to ship my product overseas and work with companies that can help me distribute. I learned how to get my product shown all around Ireland and even in Canada. Everyone has ideas, you just need the initiative to get up and put them out there. Make them come true." - Youth Entrepreneur of the Year: Amy—age 17—an NFTE participant who is now marketing customizable earmuffs and pillows with built-in headphones. A total of 1,500 participants from low income communities set up 850 businesses as part of this year's NFTE entrepreneurship programme.





**SINCE 2006**, The Ireland Funds have supported these in-school and youth center programs. From September to May teachers can attend "NFTE University" where all aspects of establishing and running a small business are taught. Teachers are then certified to teach the program in schools to students.

Students receive entrepreneurship training through training, guest speakers, hands-on product development, classroom mentors and field trips to local companies. NFTE is active in 10 countries and each year, the NFTE international chapters converge on NYC for the "Dare to Dream" Awards ceremony where the best business ideas are presented head-to-head with other young people from around the world. To date, over 500,000 young people have received NFTE education around the world.

Not all student business ideas come to full fruition, but there are clear benefits gained simply by going through the NFTE program. Participants in these programs have shown an increase in college attendance rates and in some cases the programs have been the inception for successful businesses run by young people, many of whom are from disadvantaged areas. Research from Harvard University has shown participants:

- Career aspirations increased 44%
- Interest in attending college increased 32%
- Students' business knowledge increased by 20 times vs. control group
- Leadership behavior increased 13.2%
- Belief that attaining one's goals is within one's control significantly increased

"Never before has entrepreneurship education been more important than it is today. I believe that every young person in Ireland should have enterprise education as part of their learning and development. Programmes like NFTE are vital for encouraging young people to establish small indigenous businesses, which ultimately is what our economy needs to climb out of this recession"- an NFTE Business Mentor

"We've been working with The Ireland Funds over the last four years. We're hugely grateful because it is changing young people's lives. The Grant Round has helped us reach over 3,000 young people and train over 100 additional educators. The Grant Round has also helped us develop our curriculum across all of Ireland, North and South. Not only have The Ireland Funds given us money, they've given us their time." - Maria Doherty, NFTE Program Manager



LEISURE BUDDIES is a friendship outreach project run by St. Christopher's Services in Co. Longford. It pairs people with intellectual disabilities under St. Christopher's care with volunteers from the community who create support systems and facilitate social opportunities. Leisure Buddies caters for adults who are matched with other adults with similar interests. They meet once a month (or more) for social activities, one-on-one. The friends might attend concerts, have a cup of tea or go to a local theater production. Some of the friendships have been sustained for over a decade. Youth Buddies is a youth group that brings together teens and young adults from local secondary schools for

group outings and community activities. At a time when being social is keenly important, this teen group is a unique opportunity for young people with intellectual disabilities to engage with their peers and feel included in the community. It is clear from chatting with the teens that everyone, intellectually disabled or not, is having a great time. Experts readily cite terms such as "social inclusion" and benefits such as "advancement of social and communications skills" when speaking of initiatives such as Leisure Buddies/Youth Buddies. But those involved with the program simply speak about the power of these friendships.

Since 1997, the much-acclaimed Baboró International Arts Festival has been known for bringing creative art experiences to children through their weeklong Galway event held every October. In 2012, Baboró expanded its reach and began an ambitious project beyond the Festival: engaging with 8 scientists, 6 artists, 8 teachers and 200 students in 8 primary schools in Galway city and county. Their objective was not only to bring more science exposure to children, but to do it while

combining Technology, Engineering, Maths and the Arts.

Ireland, Galway."

And so, The Baboró Environment, Arts, Science and Technology project—or BEAST! as it is now known—began. With funding from The Ireland Funds Promising Ireland Campaign Grant Round, this project is now in its second year of bringing scientists and artists from the local community into the classrooms of Galway. "That experience is breaking down the silos in our community and making science creative and fun for these kids," explains Teenagh Cunningham, General Manager of the Baboró International Arts Festival. "One of the hallmarks is that this is not a 'hit and run' program where we come in for a single session. Instead, the children do multiple sessions with visiting scientists all from the Ryan Institute and the National University of

And it isn't just the children who benefit. Teachers participate in the workshops, to inspire them to use the arts and creativity in the classroom. "I couldn't believe they were linking science and the arts but I was convinced I could learn something," says Geraldine De Paor, a teacher at the Uachtar Ard Primary School. "I can actually say my whole outlook on the teaching of science has changed."

For the scientists it's a refreshing way to look at their own research. How do you teach a group of 12 year olds about bacteria? How can you get them excited about using seaweed for fuel? It pushes the scientists to distill their content into basic and exciting lessons for the children. And

for the children it removes the stereotype of a scientist in a white lab coat conducting incomprehensible experiments. Lessons on biodiversity started in the classroom and continued with a trip to a fish hatchery in Connemara. Then, a textile artist came to the classroom to work with the students, who wanted to create a felt wall hanging and 3D models of fish. Best of all, becoming familiar with a scientist or an artist can be an inspiring thing for children. The scientists bring the children to their labs on the college campus with the aim of getting them excited about third-level education through that early familiarity.

"The feedback we're getting is tremendous," says Teenagh. "We polled parents, teachers, scientists and children last year and found 99% of the feedback was positive. Baboró has always tried to impact children in a positive way. Some of the positive outcomes we're seeing include increased engagement; children who don't always participate are interested and excited. Teachers have reported an increase in teamwork, including teamwork between children of different backgrounds who may not have interacted before. All of those things you have to develop as a young person to succeed."

Teenagh shares how The Ireland Funds have been an integral part of the young program. "We approached The Ireland Funds about supporting us because it was such a good fit with what The Ireland Funds do: it's about access, education, developing the whole child to their whole potential. Funding from The Ireland Funds has been one thing, but it has also helped us showcase what we do. The international network that is The Ireland Funds and the massive interest in them is phenomenal. For us, to be able to show the impact that The Ireland Funds can have on a program like this, is just brilliant."

The best impact may be summed up by Katie, a child involved in the Baboró BEAST! program. When asked "How come you're happy today?" She simply replied, "Today is Monday, it's science. Science is really art in a scientific way."

LOUISE'S DAD, KEVIN, remembers the moment he heard the word that strikes fear into the hearts of parents the world over-Leukemia-"I slid down the wall and put my head in my hands." Suddenly an ordinary family was about to embark on a journey of extraordinary emotions in a battle to save their little girl's life.

Less than 24 hours after Louise was diagnosed she was in a bed in Our Lady's Children's Hospital, Crumlin braving her first dose of chemotherapy. Unfortunately it would be the first of many intensive treatments, including multiple blood transfusions and heavy doses of steroids. The staff there and the treatments are the best in Ireland, but the infrastructure of the ward itself has long been lacking.

"You've got the best team in the world playing in substandard conditions," says Louise's dad Kevin as he explains the reality of life in the hospital.

Today, The Ireland Funds are helping Our Lady's Children's Hospital, Crumlin out of its previous dark, cramped, substandard space built in the 1950s, to a modern world-class facility serving Ireland's families.

"We were able to go to supporters and say 'We have The Ireland Funds helping us' and that was a great start," explains Joe Quinsey, Chief Executive of The Children's Medical & Research Foundation. "But more importantly than that, The Ireland Funds have stayed with us and allowed us to connect with the broader network so we can sustain and grow. What I saw through our work with The Ireland Funds was it wasn't about the organization, it was about the cause. They had an immediate and passionate connection to what we are representing here which is improving the lives of sick children and their families in Ireland. That is the support we received in spades from The Ireland Funds."

THE Children's Medical & Research Foundation is the driver behind these improvements. As body that fundraises for Our Lady's Children's Hospital, Crumlin, it is helping the Hospital build a new pediatric cancer ward and a new cardiac wing. "Over the years, the technology chemotherapy here



had advanced but what really hadn't advanced was the infrastructure. It was no longer acceptable to be treating children in the space we had," says Professor Owen Smith, a member of the team that diagnoses and treats cancer in children as well oversees stem cell transplants. "It was small, dark, cramped, and had a high risk of infections as 19 children were sharing two bathrooms. The new facility has restored dignity to their cancer journey. The psycho-social benefits are fantastic. We have a school room for the children and adolescents have their own space as well. Parents can now stay with their children in single rooms that are healthy light-filled spaces with en suite bathrooms. The funding for this facility is absolutely essential."

It is the only facility in Ireland that diagnoses and treats children with cancer and currently provides all cardiac services across Ireland for children with heart disease. Phase I that delivered these improvements is now complete and Phase II which will continue to improve the medication/treatment room, create a new play zone, redesign a school room and improve staff space is underway.

### RESEARCH = REAL RESULTS.

Research is another pillar of what The Children's Medical & Research Foundation does for Ireland's children. In 2009 a renovation major the National Children's Research Centre (NCRC) was undertaken and today the research into pediatric conditions such autism, as obesity, cancers, diabetes and others is

shared not only with Our Lady's Children's Hospital but other pediatric research groups across Ireland. It receives no Government funding relies entirely on philanthropy. "For a small country the amount that we have contributed in terms of surgical research into birth defects is enormous," says Professor Prem Puri, President of NCRC. "If you go into any part of the world and talk to a pediatric surgeon they will know of the NCRC because they will have come across the work that comes out of here."

### THE IRELAND FUNDS-A LINK TO THE BROADER NETWORK

Although the hospital is well known in Ireland, the needs and the call for fundraising has up until now not been as well known outside the island. The Children's Medical & Research Foundation approached The American Ireland Fund for advice on fundraising and received much more than just a check. The American Ireland Fund assisted the Foundation in 2013 by helping to coordinate a New York City fundraising Gala that raised US support for the rebuilding of their cancer and cardiac improvements.

# 2013 CONFERENCE

The largest-ever assembly of supporters gathered for The Worldwide Ireland Funds 2013 Conference in Kildare. It was an important opportunity for donors to see first-hand the success and impact of The Ireland Funds Promising Ireland Campaign on Irish charities across Ireland and around the world.



A welcome lunch was held at the legendary K Club where the Conference was based. Supporters were welcomed by President & CEO Kieran McLoughlin who provided an overview of the three days to come. He introduced Young Leader and Chief Executive of the Gaelic Players Association Dessie Farrell and Chairman Hugo MacNeill of The Ireland Funds in Ireland. They both spoke about the importance of the Promising Ireland Campaign and the donors' upcoming visits that afternoon to projects that had benefited from the Campaign.

Supporters then broke into small groups that visited 12 projects in the Dublin area. The Belvedere Youth Club, the Esker Amateur Boxing Club, An Cosán, Trinity Access Programmes, Undergraduate Awards, Barnardos, Barretstown, Kids in the Kitchen, Fighting Words, Headstrong & Gaelic Players Association, Social Entrepreneurs Ireland and the Irish Georgian Society showcased their work and difference that The Ireland Funds Promising Ireland Campaign had made. Most importantly, it was an opportunity for donors to see the tremendous results of their philanthropy and relationships with The Ireland Funds. For the projects, it was a chance to extend their heartfelt thanks to donors.

The Conference then went to Áras An Uachtaráin, the home of the President of Ireland Michael D. Higgins. Each guest was welcomed by President Higgins and his wife Sabina. President Higgins addressed those gathered and congratulated The Worldwide Ireland Funds on what they have achieved for Ireland since establishment in 1976. He announced that the Promising Ireland Campaign had an initial goal to raise \$100 million but would in fact achieve \$150 million by its close at the end of 2013. The President noted that 1,200 charities across Ireland have benefited from the work of The Ireland Funds. It was a remarkable announcement that was enthusiastically received by the delegates representing many of the 12 countries where The Ireland Funds operate.























Following a meeting of The American Ireland Fund Board of Directors, Kieran McLoughlin, President & CEO of The Worldwide Ireland Funds welcomed the delegates to the plenary session of the Conference where they discussed the state of The Ireland Funds and their future. He presented "relationship" as the theme of the plenary session, in particular the powerful relationship between the donors and Ireland.

Cilian Fennell, TV producer and story-teller, began the plenary with a reflection on the development of "Irishness" and the ties that bring the diaspora together. He applauded the care that The Ireland Funds and their donors demonstrated towards the island. He concluded by comparing them to the poets and artists of Ireland, pointing that philanthropy was the donors' "paintbrush and poem" for changing and strengthening Ireland.

Kieran McLoughlin continued the plenary session by sharing a report on the state of the Funds over the past year, and urged donors to think of The Ireland Funds as an embodiment of "private giving for the public good." He pointed to The Ireland Funds not as a charity, but as a community and a "fellowship focused on philanthropy." He recapped the success of The Promising Ireland Campaign because of the generosity of this community and reminded those gathered that 100% of funds raised were from private philanthropic sources at no cost to the taxpayer. Over 350 organizations across Ireland and around the world had benefited from the Promising Ireland Campaign so far and donors should feel proud that one third of the organization's total earnings had been achieved in the last five years.

Director Ireland Caitriona Fottrell presented on the deep needs of the nonprofit sector across Ireland. She highlighted the excellence of so many organizations in Ireland and how key the support of The Ireland Funds was to their success. She outlined the ways in which The Ireland Funds were helping from grant making to mentorship of organizations to identifying key areas of need and emerging leaders in the sector. The programs

developed by The Ireland Funds such as No Mind Left Behind, The US Northern Ireland Mentorship Program, Music Generation and The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition are delivering positive outcomes to Ireland.

Pat Tully and Caitlin Duffy presented to the Young Leaders gathered at the Conference on the accomplishments of the Young Leaders Society over the past year and gave a city-by-city summary of what each chapter was doing. They covered events, recruiting, and the annual NYC Summit and its objectives. Pat shared suggestions that had been submitted by Young Leaders for new initiatives and made the announcement that the Young Leaders had now raised over \$1 million in unrestricted income for the work of The Ireland Funds.

That evening, the Gala was held on the grounds of the K Club. The evening's guest of honor was An Taoiseach Enda Kenny who came to celebrate the *Promising Ireland* Campaign's milestone accomplishment. An Taoiseach expressed his pride in the work of The Ireland Funds and the difference those in the room had made for Ireland at a most difficult time. The night also marked the 41st Annual American Ireland Fund AWB Vincent Literary Award. Kieran McLoughlin used the occasion to recall the unique spirit of the late Billy Vincent for whom the award was named. Maryon Davies Lewis, longtime supporter of the Literary Award was present and Kieran thanked her for her generosity. Author Roddy Doyle—co-founder of Fighting Words, a creative writing centre for young people supported by The Ireland Funds—won the 2013 award. He spoke about the transformative power of writing for the thousands of children that had been reached by Fighting Words. He concluded by announcing to a standing ovation, that he would be giving his prize of 25,000 euro to Fighting Words to continue their work.

Co-founder of The Ireland Funds Dan Rooney took the podium to speak of Chairman Loretta Brennan Glucksman's extraordinary role with The American Ireland Fund. He recounted stories of her grace and humor over the years and she was welcomed to the stage with a standing ovation from those gathered. Loretta gave a heartfelt and emotional thank you to Ireland Fund supporters for all they had accomplished during her period as Chairman. Kieran McLoughlin produced the surprise of the eveninga portrait of Loretta by the great Irish artist James Hanley. Hanley came to the stage to present Loretta this very special memento of her faithfulness to Ireland and to the work of The Ireland Funds. Loretta left the stage to a second standing ovation as supporters recognized her final Ireland Funds Conference in the role of Chairman.

The evening continued back at the K-Club. It was filled with song, camaraderie and the craic that is a hallmark at The Ireland Funds Annual Conference.













# DAY THREE

The final day of the Conference allowed supporters to enjoy time together in this beautiful area of Ireland. Groups visited Russborough House, considered the best example of Palladian architecture and the historic home of Sir Alfred and Lady Beit, for private tours and lunch. This was followed by a tour of Ireland's National Stud and Japanese Gardens where they learned about Ireland's grand tradition of raising some of the best racehorses in the world.

Another group golfed the legendary course at the K Club. It was "Ireland vs. the rest of the world" and at the end of a day that showcased every type of Irish weather from pouring rain to brilliant sunshine, the Irish team came out on top with all golfers smiling.

The Conference came to its official close with a celebration at the restored historic village at Lyon on the banks of the Grand Canal. Supporters reconvened for a final evening together and the highlight of the evening was pausing to remember once again the compassion and style of longtime Ireland Funds supporter, the late AWB Vincent. Kieran McLoughlin, Dr. Maurice Hayes, Bill Cullen and finally Loretta Brennan Glucksman each spoke movingly of their memories of "Billy" and his legacy to Ireland and The Ireland Funds.

Supporters left Kildare with a renewed understanding of their relationship to Ireland and the role that The Ireland Funds play in facilitating that relationship. The three days in Kildare strengthened the global Irish making a difference together.









GEORGE MOORE, BOARD DIRECTOR OF THE AMERICAN IRELAND FUND AND HEAD OF THE AMERICAN IRELAND FUND'S FINANCE COMMITTEE. PASSED AWAY IN MAY OF 2013.

Regarded as one of the most successful Irish-American businessmen of his time, George established Targus Information in Virginia and bought into Erne Heritage Holdings, parent company of Belleek China and Galway Irish Crystal.

His Irish philanthropic and Irish interests were extensive. In addition to serving on the Board of The American Ireland Fund, he served on the boards of the Northern Ireland Trade and Investment Council, The Flax Trust, and the Taoiseach's economic advisory board. He was the Trustee of the Northern Ireland Memorial Fund and was involved with the Irish Technology Leadership Group as well as the Global Irish Economic Forum. He received the Outstanding Alumnus Award from University College Dublin in 1991 and was awarded an honorary doctorate in sciences by the University of Ulster in 2006. In 2007, he received an honorary CBE from Queen Elizabeth in recognition of his contribution to Northern Ireland's economy. He and his wife Angela were key donors to the University College Dublin Science Centre.

Kieran McLoughlin, President & CEO of The Worldwide Ireland Funds said, "George's untimely passing is first and foremost a devastating loss for Angela and their family. In addition, his death is an enormous loss to Ireland. Irish America and philanthropy everywhere."






## Boston Young Leaders Spring Social

In that, he is an example to all scholars in never resting or being satisfied with his information, he is always eager to refine, review, and embrace every new shred of information and evidence.

This makes the second edition a vital addition to the body of wine and wine history writing because, like the first edition it is breaking new ground again, telling new stories and bringing an even clearer picture of the Irish hand in sculpting our present picture of wine."

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

## The Ireland Fund of Monaco Residential Bursaries

Awarded annually, The Ireland Fund of Monaco Residential Bursaries were established to enable writers born or living in Ireland to pursue a current project during a one-month residency at the Princess Grace Irish Library in Monaco. We are pleased to present this personal reflection of Professor Ríonach uí Ógáin on her experience in Monaco.

#### About the Author

Ríonach uí Ógáin, MA, PhD (National University of Ireland), is Director of the National Folklore Collection, University College Dublin. She has published numerous articles on traditional song and music and has lectured widely on the subject.

a folklorist it was the ideal time to experience some of the local traditions that straddle St Patrick's Day and the end of the Lenten season to include the Easter celebrations in Monaco. In search of Monégasque tradition and lore, I experienced a sense of empathy with what might be termed the minority Monégasque expression of identity in numerous ways. Much of this reminded me of home in Ireland. Bi-lingual street signs indicated the dual languages within the society. Restaurants such as L'Ostrega de Mùnegu at the Place d'Armes emphasised a sense of pride in language and in traditional, local food. Irish tradition mingled with the Monégasque when the lights on the Prince's Palace shone green for St. Patrick's Day. As might be expected, other events had been organised by the Princess Grace Irish Library for this day which included the music of Cór Mhaigh Eo and harmonised songs of the group CODA. They were very well received and these events were reminders of the global nature that has become of the St. Patrick's Day celebrations.

A highlight of my stay was something that appeared to be very old indeed and should really only be experienced live 'sur le rocher'. The gathering for the Procession de Pénitents took place on the evening of Good Friday. Early on in the course of my visit I had been told of this holy week procession and I looked forward to it. When I arrived, an atmosphere of anticipated ritual was evident on the rock around the area of the Chapelle de la Miséricorde before the procession began. A voice of authority called out 'Je cherche un pénitent' and gave orders such as 'Avancez' as participants gathered before the procession began. The sombre music which accompanied the procession of centurions on horseback, the nuns, priests, brothers, friars and children, all suitably attired, were mindful of the Passion of Good Friday.



For me in Monaco, the universal nature of folk belief and of religious celebration was affirmed. The opportunity afforded to me by the Ireland Fund of Monaco to pursue research and experience aspects of life and tradition in Monaco is greatly appreciated. The day-to-day experience of life at the Princess Grace Irish Library was greatly enhanced by Judith Gantley, Géraldine Lance, Síle Jackson and Francis O'Hara in particular.

Another highlight of my visit was my discussion with students of the local senior high school-Lycée Albert Ier-who shared some of their customs, beliefs and lore with me. They are proud of the local saint, Saint Devote, and were very interested in Irish, Irish-English and Irish tradition. We compared notes on belief associated with Friday the thirteenth, on matters of luck and ill-luck of the black cat and we agreed that all this is probably part of a tradition which may well be hundreds of years old. The Monaco experience at the Princess Grace Irish Library was an enriching, memorable experience which will remain with me for a long time.
